## Key achievements to date until July 2021:

- High Quality Physical Education lessons for all year groups take place weekly
- Offer a broad, balanced and engaging curriculum with well differentiated, progressive lessons.
- Provided school sports kits and equipment for sports teams. For example: kit, shin pads, football boots and other extra equipment.
- Received the Sainsbury's Bronze 2013-2014, Gold 2014-2015, Gold 2015-2016, Gold 2016-2017, 2017-2018, 2018-2019 received platinum Schools Kite Mark Award.
- Received recognition at the Manchester Sports awards in 2016, 2018 and 2019.
- Received local community award for making a difference in the community through sport 2019.
- EYFS, including Nursery, provided additional opportunities for outdoor learning and activities to offset lockdowns.
- Improved Education with Character through sport, for example, the development of resilience, co-operation and team-work.
- Facilitated professional development opportunities for the PE lead.
- Extra-curricular sports opportunities were provided during school holidays for vulnerable families and key worker families.
- Annual sports day event for all key stages. This year, due to Covid, this was a socially distanced Race for Life to support Cancer Research.
- Sporting activities outside of school are celebrated (assemblies, social media).
- On-site adventure day provided for Year 6 as an alternative to the usual residential.
- Development of a Forest School area within the school grounds.

Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:

- New PE lead to partake in appropriate CPD to develop her effectiveness.
- Continue to provide training for staff across the school, improving outdoor games, dance and gymnastics.
- Continue to improve lunch and break time provision aiming to have more children active in games at lunch.
- Provide more equipment for break time.
- Maintain Education with Character through sport.
- Re-establish after school sports clubs following Covid.
- Promote and create stronger links with local clubs (football, dance, cricket etc.)
- Increase parental engagement with active/healthy lifestyles Invite parents to extended services/outdoor activities, cook and move sessions (once safe and appropriate to do so).
- Develop the role of Sports Ambassadors to utilise PESSPA resources.
- Continue to develop the PE curriculum as the progress model.
- Purchase new equipment to aid the delivery of high-quality PE sessions, and engaging break/lunchtime sessions.
- Further develop the role of the Forest Schools Lead to deliver sessions across the school.









Staff member has been trained to deliver sessions to all pupils. There was a focus on EYFS pupils during 2020/2021. • Live online PE sessions were provided by the Sports Lead for children

who were isolating, and during National lockdowns.
