

Key Vocabulary

Carnivore	A carnivore is an animal that eats meat.	
Herbivore	A herbivore is an animal that eats only plants.	
Omnivore	An omnivore eats both meat and plants.	
Amphibians	Amphibians are animals such as frogs and toads that can live both on land and in water	
Birds	A bird is a creature with feathers and wings.	
Fish	A fish is a creature that lives in water and has a tail and fins. There are many different kinds of fish.	
Mammals	Mammals are animals such as humans, dogs, lions, and whales. In general, female mammals give birth to babies, and feed their young with milk.	
Reptiles	Reptiles are a group of cold-blooded animals which have skins covered with small hard plates called scales and lay eggs.	
Human	People including children and adults.	

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<p>Sight</p>	<p>Your eyes let you see all the things around you.</p>	 <p>sight</p>
<p>Hearing</p>	<p>Your ears let you listen to all the things around you. Your brain is able to tell what different sounds are.</p>	 <p>hearing</p>
<p>Touch</p>	<p>Your skin gives you the sense of touch. You can tell if something is warm, cold, smooth or rough without even looking at it!</p>	 <p>touch</p>
<p>Taste</p>	<p>Your sense of taste comes from your tongue. You can tell if something tastes bitter or sweet. You might have some tastes you like and some you don't.</p>	 <p>taste</p>
<p>Smell</p>	<p>You smell using your nose. Your nose can tell if things smell nice or not nice.</p>	 <p>smell</p>
