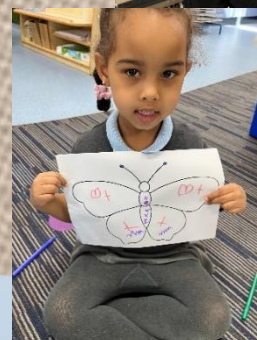

THIS WEEK'S BIG READ: GLASTONBURY FESTIVAL

Tickets for the event start at £373.50. Lots of volunteers help run the festival, and because of that, a significant proportion of the profits go to charity.

In 2025, the festival featured an exciting mix of headline acts, with The 1975, Olivia Rodrigo and Charli XCX taking centre stage. In 2026, Glastonbury will take a planned break to let the farmland recover!
